South Fork Wind Farm has finally started after 9 years of talk and preparation.

South Fork is the first of 5 wind farm projects slated for Long Island over the next 5 years. This project has 12 turbines offshore and comes on shore in Wainscott. We have had four Local 25 members working on the offshore vessel and installing cable since February. The wind turbines should be installed this summer. We will need additional manpower for this offshore work. Sunrise Wind which is 96 turbines will be starting later this year. Inside the centerfold are some pictures of the cable laying vessel and some pictures of our members doing there GWO training.

BUSINESS MANAGER'S REPORT

Sisters and Brothers, as I sit here and write this article for the Conduit, it is the first day of spring. We definitely had a pretty good winter this year with hardly any snow.

Employment has stayed steady for the winter months. The book one unemployment throughout the winter has been between 35 to 50 on the out of work book; with approximately a 2 to 4 week wait to get a

long call job. There have been lots of short calls this winter for the Nassau Coliseum and for UBS Arena. There is plenty of work this year, with some jobs that have started and some that will be breaking ground very soon. Some of the jobs are UBS Retail Village, Good Samaritan Hospital, Jakes 58, South Shore University Hospital, Mather Hospital, Northpoint project, Brookhaven Lab, Cold Spring Harbor Lab, South Fork Wind Farm, and Sunrise Wind Farm; just to name a few.

The South Fork Wind Farm is in full swing. Haugland Energy did the 3-mile duct bank from the East Hampton substation to the transition vault on the beach in Wainscott. Hawkeye is currently pulling the cable to the transition vault where it will be spliced to the offshore cable that is in the process of being installed by a company by the name of Deme Offshore US, LLC. Haugland Energy is currently building the HVDC converter station at the East Hampton substation. There are approximately 60 Local 25 members working on the converter station. Deme Offshore US, LLC. has signed an agreement with Local 25 and has had our members out at sea on the cable-laying vessel for 2 rotations, lasting approximately 4 weeks since the beginning of February. I would like to thank Brothers Jason Hood, Matt Rocco, Devin Ovalle, and Hugo Philemy for a job well done. These Brothers worked 7 days a week, 12 hour shifts out at sea. These 2 rotations are the first of many that will be employing Local 25 members. The offshore wind industry that has come to Long Island is going to be a huge industry for Local 25 over the next few years. South Fork Wind is the first to come to Long Island and is relatively small with 12 turbines. That should employ around 30 to 50 Local 25 members on the offshore portion of this project. Later this year. Sunrise Wind will start, which will have 96 turbines and will come ashore at Smiths Point County Park. There will be a 17-mile duct bank from Smiths Point to the Holtsville substation where another HVDC converter station will be built. Projected manpower for the offshore portion is 100 to 125 members, plus another 100 on the converter station. There is a total of 5 wind farms slated to be built off Long Island by 2027, with hundreds of jobs projected for Local 25 members. Like I have said at past union meetings, we need to man the offshore portion of this work, because if we do not, the other trades will. As I write this article, 2 trades have already filed jurisdictional grievances with the National Building Trades down in Washington, DC against IBEW Local 25, trying to get us off the ships. So, anybody interested in working offshore, please contact my office.

Brothers and Sisters, that ends my report for this issue of the Conduit. Remember to work safe, turn off energized circuits, and always stick together out there.



NEC CODE CORNER~

This month we will examine the 2023 National Electrical Code, specifically Article 210.8 **Ground-Fault** Circuit Interrupter Protection for Personel. It is typical for this code section to be revised when the code book is updated every three years, and this latest edition is no exception. The document that governs the creation on the NEC, the NEC Style Manual, has been revised to allow for the use of acronyms in the NEC. The "Ground-fault circuit-interrupter term protection for personnel" has been replaced in various places in the NEC with the term "Class A GFCI" because this class of GFCI limits the ground-fault current to 4 to 6 milliamperes, for the protection of personnel, and the acronyn GFCI is commonly used in the electrical industry. In Article 100 Definitions, the informational note following the definition for Ground-Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI), explains that Class A ground-fault circuit interrupters trip when the groundfault current is 6 mA or higher and do not trip when the ground-fault current is less than 4 mA. Another significant change occurred in 210.8(A)(6), Kitchens. List item (6) has been revised so that ALL kitchen receptacles require ground-fault current-interruption for personnel, not just those receptacles serving countertops. The 2023 edition of the National Electrical Code has specific language concerning many types of installations. Remember to consult the code book for additional information. The Outline and Language of the code is included below. Practice using the Codeology Method to answer all your code challenges.

CHAPTER, **ARTICLE**, PART. and **SECTION!**

2023 National Electrical Code 2 Wiring and Protection Chapter **Article 210 Branch Circuits** L General Part 210.8 Ground-Fault Circuit-Section **Interrupter Protection for** Personnel.

210.8 Ground-Fault Circuit-Interrupter **Protection for Personnel.**

Class Α GFCI Α listed shall provide protection in accordance with 210.8(A) through (F). The GFCI shall be installed in a readily accessible location.

Informational Note: See 215.9 for GFCI protection on feeders.

For the purposes of this section, the distance from receptacles shall be measured as the shortest path the power supply cord connected to the receptacle would follow without piercing a floor, wall, ceiling, or fixed barrier.

210.8(A) Dwelling Units.

All 125-volt through 250-volt receptacles installed in the following locations and supplied by single-phase branch circuits rated 150 volts or less to ground shall have ground-fault circuit-interrupter protection for personnel:

- (1) Bathrooms
- (2) Garages and also accessory buildings that have a floor located at or below grade level not intended as habitable rooms and limited to storage areas, work areas, and areas of similar use
- (3) Outdoors
- (4) Crawl spaces at or below grade level
- (5) Basements Receptacles installed under the 210.8(A) (5) exception to

(Continued) requirements of 210.52(G).

- (6) Kitchens
- (7) Areas with sinks and permanent provisions for food preparation, beverage preparation, or cooking
- (8) Sinks where receptacles are installed within 1.8 m (6 ft) from the top inside edge of the bowl of the sink
- (9) Boathouses
- (10) Bathtubs or shower stalls where receptacles are installed within
 1.8 m (6 ft) of the outside edge of the bathtub or shower stall
- (11) Laundry areas
- (12) Indoor damp and wet locations

So what does this mean?

This revision for 2023 NEC at 210.8(A) (6), Dwelling Units - Kitchens, requires ground-fault circuit-interrupter (GFCI) protection for all cord-and-plug connected equipment in the kitchen. The 2020 NEC language - "(6) Kitchens - where the receptacles are installed to serve the countertop surfaces", has been deleted, as shown in the struckthrough text. The Consumer Products Safety Commision (CPSC), statistics indicate that between 2011 and 2022 there were over 80 electrocutions of personnel working on appliances or other equipment at the countertop and beyond the countertop in kitchens. This revision reveals that GFCI protection should be installed to protect a person working with cord-and-plug connected appliances or equipment because electrical hazards can occur anywhere, not just countertops. Another consideration is that many appliances have a grounded frame, which could be used as a return current path to the source, creating an increased

risk to the user when working energized while troubleshooting appliances. GFCI protection reacting at low fault current values between 4 to 6 milliamps responding in 1/40 of a second (0.025 seconds) to protect personnel is a safer approach than just relying on overcurrent protection devices, fuses or circuit breakers, which were designed to protect conductors and equipment from overcurrents; overloads, short circuits and high value ground-faults. It is important to realize that GFCI protection is required for all 125-volt through 250-volt receptacles within the kitchen and not just those receptacles located at countertop locations.

The 2023 edition of the National Electrical Code certainly meets the purpose of the code – sensible revisions reflecting advances in technology along with industry practices for the practical safeguarding of persons and property from hazards arising from the use of electricity.





ICYMI – OFFSHORE WIND

Sisters & Brothers,

ICYMI - Offshore Wind has come to our shores! For the first time in our jurisdiction, IBEW Local 25 has folks working off the coast of Long Island on the first commercial scale offshore wind farm. Not only a first for us, but for the country as well. This exciting new endeavor will pave the way for new opportunities for our members. This comes with its challenges, however. Lengthy and vigorous training is required should you choose to work offshore. Like needing a DOT physical for a CDL, there are physical pre-requisites and Global Wind Organisation (GWO) training necessary to qualify anyone interested in pursuing this work.

Jason Hood, Matt Rocco, Hugo Philemy, Devin Ovalle, and Gary Bollmann have all taken the training. Those mentioned have either been on the Living Stone, a Cable Lay Vessel (CLV), or will soon be shipping off. Installing the subsea high-voltage export cable is one of the first tasks offshore. With approximately 33 miles of cable aboard, the CLV is currently plowing its way to the Offshore Sub-Station (OSS). Some of the challenges ahead of us: getting Local 25 IBEW members interested in the type of work, jurisdictional decisions with other trades, overseas wind contractors not accustomed to doing business in the US, as well as many others.

We are at the forefront of what can potentially be a tremendous opportunity for our members, but we can't miss the boat. Interest in a different work culture is needed if IBEW is to maintain its hold on this work. Highvoltage splicing/jointing, SCADA fiber-optics splicing, and many other specialty tasks will be a part of the installation, and training will be needed for all of them.

Simply put, we need your help; we need our members to rise to the occasion once again. An IBEW presence in offshore wind will provide jobs far into the future, but it's up to you.

If you're interested in pursuing these opportunities, I urge you to call our office and find out how you can help.

- Must have a High School Diploma or a High School Equivalency Diploma such as TASC or GED (Proof is required at the time of application)
- Must have taken and passed Elementary Algebra, New York State Math 1 (or equivalent) or

Algebra Regents Math (Transcript Proof is required at the time of application) (Transcripts or Certificates of Completion of courses taken after High School can also be submitted. For example: College, Technical School, Military Records, etc.)

• Must be a resident within the geographical area of Nassau/Suffolk County for at least 12 months prior to the date of application (Proof is required at the time of application)

- Must attest to the following criteria as indicated on the application:
- Be able to climb and work from ladders, scaffold, poles and towers of various heights
- Be able to crawl and work in confined spaces such as attics, manholes and crawlspaces
- Must be able to read and understand English
- Must be able to hear and understand verbal instructions and warnings in English
- Must have a valid NYS driver's license to operate company vehicles
- Must have reliable transportation to and from various work sites and related instruction within the geographical area
- Must receive a qualifying score on the NJATC/AIR aptitude test administered by the JATC
- Must be interviewed by the JATC
- Must submit to and pass a substance abuse test, paid for by the JATC, before final acceptance




